



### Page 2 Alumnus Monored as Teacher of the Year

*Jim Mandl '90* is in his fifth year teaching at the Warren Consolidated Schools Career Preparation Center (CPC) in Sterling Heights, Michigan. In his classroom, students are required to participate in a number of design competitions as part of the CAD curriculum at CPC. One of them is the annual design competition sponsored by the American Society of Body Engineers (ASBE), an arm of the Society of Automotive Engineers (SAE). This competition gives students an opportunity to have their design skills judged by automotive industry engineers.

On April 10th, the ASBE held its 54th annual design competition awards banquet at the Center campus of Macomb County Community College. *Jim Mandl '90* was honored by the organization as their Teacher of the Year. From over 100 drawings submitted to the ASBE, 22 of Jim's students were chosen as top 30 finalists.

Student drawings were judged in two categories – Mechanical Drawing and Computer-Aided Design (CAD). In the Mechanical Drawing competition, his students swept the top three places; in the CAD competition, he had 19 students place in the top 24, including 2nd and 3rd places.

Success always comes from various avenues of support. Jim gives credit for his professional success to his parents, wife, and the other CAD teachers he's developed friendships with, but mainly to his former teachers.

"In many ways, my high school career was better preparation for life than college was," said Mandl. He has difficulty remembering the names of his college instructors, but "will never forget the impact teachers like Fr. John Kiselica, Mr. Bob "Pops" Kelly, Dr. Steven Konopacki, Mr. Ken Parent, and Mr. Anthony Borton" had on his life. "Looking back, I'm touched by the way these teachers dedicated their lives to helping students succeed," Mandl said. "I want to do the same for my students."

#### Grad Founds Mondenominational Wilderness Retreat in U.P.

The Companions of Christ the Lamb Retreat Center (CCL) offers wilderness retreats on over 1,000 acres in the Eastern Upper Peninsula. On most days the only sounds heard at the CCL are the wind singing through pines and the babble of a small stream, but it wasn't always like that for Father *Jack Fabian '59*. In 1995 he heard a voice while visiting the 960 acres near Paradise, Mich. that were to become his future home. It said, 'This is the place I've prepared for you,'' Father Fabian said. 'It was undeniable, and it was the voice of Mary.''


Such events are not uncommon for Father Fabian and members of the CCL, the public association of the faithful he formed in 1989. CCL members were looking for property on which to begin their ministry of wilderness retreats and outdoor living skills when Father Fabian and others found the section of Upper Peninsula forest. "There is something very special about our place, it is very quiet and holy ground," Father Fabian writes in his book detailing the history of CCL.

The retreat center is located in Chippewa County, off M-123 between Newberry and Paradise. The CCL center is reached by driving relatively good dirt roads about eight miles north of M-123 and following homemade signs with the letters "CCL." Mass is celebrated at noon each weekday. On Sunday, Mass is at 10 a.m. The pews are hewn from cedar logs and are hard, there are no kneelers but worshippers kneel on the floor as they give thanks and praise for the blessings of a simple lifestyle.

CCL's ministry is to provide wilderness retreats. They draw upon the history of such retreats found in sacred scripture, including the examples of John the Baptist, Moses and especially Christ going into the wilderness to find silence and let God speak to their hearts. In that tradition, CCL now offers the ability to camp at a number of retreat sites or use one of several log hermitages on the property to do retreats of varying lengths. The hermitages are small cabins that feature a bed, a woodstove and an indoor minimum flush toilet. There is no electricity on the property. Most of the cabins are single units, although there are also larger cabins that can house a group of retreatants. In his book, Father *Jack Fabian '59* remarks that never in a thousand years would he have guessed that he would be called to start a religious community, but that the way it has turned out could not be more pleasing for him. "I loved parish life, but was always looking out the window, wondering when I'd be able to be outdoors next," he said.
