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Bob Lantzy '64 300 Wins

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Lantzy '64 Earns 300th Career Wictory

The long tradition of Eisenhower football begins with **Bob Lantzy** '64. He is the only head football coach in school history. In his 41st year as head coach, Lantzy has reached a milestone few coaches come close to reaching - 300 victories.

On Friday, October 7, Eisenhower played host to Dakota and there was much more on the line than trying to get Lantzy his 299th win. The Eagles and Cougars were playing for a share of the MAC Red Division championship.

In a game that featured a little bit of everything, the Eagles provided Lantzy with a memorable second-half rally. They scored 20 unanswered points, including two touchdowns in the final quarter, defeating the Cougars 33-21. This gave the Eagles at least a share of the MAC Red Division championship and moved Lantzy within one win of his 300th victory.

"It's hard to believe," said Lantzy, when asked about the opportunity to earn his 300th victory while going for a league championship at the same time. "It seems like it has flown by. This season has gone by so fast; it's hard to believe it. I'm looking forward to every game, every moment and every practice. I don't get tired of any of it. I enjoy the kids and my assistant coaches have been great all year," he added.

The mood was festive and upbeat at Chippewa Valley on Friday, October 14, as the home crowd packed the stands for Senior Night against Eisenhower. It was the Eagles, however, who walked away with the lifetime memories. Ike scored on all seven of its possessions while wrapping up the outright MAC Red Division title with a 45-0 victory against the Big Reds. It was the Eagles' first since 2004. "This has been a long time coming," Lantzy said. "I think the Macomb Daily said we had five (championships) in a row from 2000-2004 and then we had to wait a long time to get another MAC championship," Lantzy said. "It was well worth it," he added. "We worked really hard. We had a lot of years where we had to fight and be very tough. I thank every player from over those years where we had to fight and keep hanging there to be competitive," Lantzy said. This win was also No. 300 in the storied career of the head coach. He is just the ninth coach in state history to reach this milestone. "I just can't believe it," Lantzy said. "I don't feel old enough to have 300 wins and have

 coached in 400 some odd games. It just doesn't feel that way. It's been a pleasure. I still love practice," He added. Lantzy ran his career record to 300-114-1. Eisenhower (7-1 overall, 5-0 MAC Red) held Chippewa Valley (3-5, 1-4) without a first down while racking up 214 yards of offense in the first half. The Big Reds gained just four yards in the first 24 minutes. The Eagles' offense outgained CV 332-29 in the contest. "I thought every aspect of the game – the kicking game, the defense, offense – it was really a picture-perfect day for us," Lantzy said.

Eisenhower quarterback Joe Zerafa was precise all night, going 12-of-16 for 162 yards and two touchdowns. Four of his passes were caught by Dan Chmielewski, who gained 71 yards and a touchdown. On the ground, Shane King rushed for 61 yards and two touchdowns on 12 carries. The Eagles established the run early in the contest. On its first drive of the contest, lke rushed 11 times, finding pay dirt as King rushed for a two-yard gain on third goal.

After the Eisenhower defense quickly got off the field, it was back to work for the offense. This time, it took just three plays for the Eagles to go 37 yards across the goal line. Zerafa's 34-yard pass to Daniel Venditti set up a three yard rush into the end zone. Seconds into the second, Eisenhower started its third drive from the 50 with similar results. This time, Ike used three passes and three rushes, with Zerafa finding Yousseff Bujaidar in the back of the end zone.

The Eagles scored again midway through the quarter following a Big Reds fumble on the 20. Orlando Meeks

eventually rushed seven yards into the end zone to give the Eagles a 28-0 lead. Late in the quarter, lke showed its prowess in the kicking game as well, as Danny Gojcaj booted a 37 yard field goal that split the uprights and may have cleared the posts from 50 yards out. Gojcaj was involved in every Eisenhower score, as he also finished 6-of-6 on point-after tries.

The Eagles started the second half with the ball and worked the clock on the opening drive. Ike took 5:11 off the clock before Zerafa connected with Chmielewski on a 29-yard touchdown pass, giving the Eagles a 38-0 lead. By rule, the running clock was put into effect with 6:44 remaining in the third quarter.

After taking over with 8:03 left, Jay Miron added a one-yard score to put the icing on the Eagles' cake. Eisenhower will finish the regular season with a home contest against MAC White champion Cousino. While some coaches might use next week as a chance to rest some tired legs and work in some reserves, don't expect to see anything different on the Eisenhower sideline. "You can't go into the playoffs thinking anything but, 'Now it's six straight games,'" Lantzy said. "Cousino is going to be a smash mouth team. We aren't going to do anything but go after it just like it's the biggest game we've ever played. "All we're looking at – just like Cousino – it that it's a six-game playoff."

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Brother of Motyka '85 Victim of Drive-by

Reports state that Moe Motyka, brother of **John Motyka** '**85**, left his Hamtramck residence on his way to perform at the legendary Harbor House. On his way, he stopped by a friend's house on Holbrook and Brush to drop off apples and candles. Upon leaving the residence, he entered his vehicle and closed the driver's side door. Another man approached on the passenger side and asked for a ride. When the man opened the door and began to enter, another vehicle pulled along side and opened fire with a semi-automatic weapon. The would-be passenger fled with graze wounds. Moe wasn't so lucky He was killed instantly.

Moe, a local musician, was well known in the Detroit music scene. He performed with some of the top Rock and Blues entertainers including Dale Robertson, Bennie Reeves, Thornetta Davis, C.C. Collins, and Mitch Ryder's guitarist Chris Brantly. His tenor blues vocals are legendary in venues throughout Metro Detroit.

He motivated others around him with a compassionate loving energy. He often sang at the Salvation Army Gospel Choir and performed work with Fr. Ray at The Capuchin Soup Kitchen. His moniker was his gentle, warm smile and hug. His rigorous schedule consisted of 7-night-a-week performances, often performing at several venues in one day. He was considered a musical genius who played guitar and piano. He will be best remembered for writing and singing 'Raining in Detroit,' 'These Four Walls,' and 'Why Cant I Cry'".

He was laid to rest October 10th. His funeral took place at St. Florian Church in Hamtramck. Hundreds paid tribute on October 9th at Jurkiewicz and Wilk Funeral Home in Hamtramck. "This was the saddest funeral I have seen in 30-plus years in this business," said Mr. Wilk.

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A Gut Shot

From his Detroit New Blog: Going Home

I got shot in the gut Friday night (August 26). And I'm sure many of my former brothers from Harper Woods Notre Dame High School felt the same figurative bullet in the belly when they heard the news.

A 15-year-old girl was wounded in the stomach by gunfire at a football game Friday, August 26 on the campus of Chandler Park Academy High School, the site of Notre Dame for more than 50 years until its closure in 2005. Although I was too short and skinny to play football at Notre Dame, I know and love that field: the block ND painted in the center of the 50-yard-line; those tall home bleachers, sitting in them on a chilly Friday night in October; the chants we used to holler – "We are the Irish, the mighty, mighty Irish..." I'm totally familiar with the architecture of the school building to the west of the field. Nearly 35 years since graduation, I could still likely navigate it in the dark – might even be able to find my locker from senior year. I recall exactly where my parking space was during junior and senior years – on the Eastland side of the Tom Kelly Memorial Gym, almost right in front of the side door leading to the vestibule between the gym and the classrooms.

Places and buildings speak to us through echoes of our past. They are part of our very marrow, regardless of who resides there now or the names on the front of them. That's why so many of us who stepped through the doors of Shield of Faith on March 29, 2008, were totally emotionally charged. We can see ourselves making our Holy

Communion there, or standing at the altar with our new husband or wife. We can visualize the casket of a loved one being wheeled down the center aisle on its way to a hearse and nearby Mt. Olivet Cemetery. We can hear Mr. Reyes playing the pipe organ in the loft, leading us through a rousing Easter morning rendition of "Ye Sons and Daughters." Our memories make 13600 Van Dyke forever Holy Name of Jesus. And for me and the other loyal sons of Harper Woods Notre Dame, a gunshot on the football field behind 20254 Kelly Road can be heard and felt in places all across the state – and probably far beyond.

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Mappy '75 is Building a Meighborhood Not Bound by Geography

Mike Happy '82 wasn't happy. The year was 2006. Happy had recently been hired as an online editor by the Detroit News and was trying to convince his friend and former colleague, Jonathan Morgan, to apply for a job there as well. The two had previously worked together at the New York Times online division.

"I came to Detroit for a visit and Mike took me around to the neighborhood where he grew up," said Morgan. The scene that met them on Dobel Street, on the city's northeast side, was appalling. The neighborhood had been a modest blue collar suburb in the 1960s and 70s. Now the homes Happy remembered as being filled with children, bicycles, and games were derelict - abandoned, boarded up, covered in graffiti. Fletcher Field, the park where Happy had played ball as a kid, was buried in weeds and trash. The streets were empty of pedestrians. "I could see he was pretty shaken up," said Morgan.

Morgan decided to accept an offer from the Detroit News and the two friends began discussing what to do about Dobel Street. The option of doing nothing did not occur to them.

Not long after that first visit, Happy and Morgan rolled out the "Going Home" neighborhood blog at the Detroit News. Their first step was to find out who else cared. "We blogged about fixing up the park and invited former residents to a cleanup and picnic at Fletcher Field. Then we invited them back to a reunion at the local church. Almost a thousand people came. It was amazing," said Morgan.

The blog quickly became the communication hub for the "Friends of Fletcher Field." Since the first summer, said Morgan, the Friends have continued to hold reunions every year, work on and in the park, and recruit more people. "Mike and I are still active but now it's mostly perpetuated by current and former residents. They've reconnected with local businesses and organizations. They're building a network around a location that is not bounded by geography." Current activities include a summer reading program, softball, a community garden, and holiday events.

The Fletcher Park project has been a success by any standard. As Happy noted, "People often want to help but they don't know how. 'Going Home' told folks a not-so-happy story and then offered them a solution, a way to assist in changing the ending. The Detroit News is supposed to be the guardian of the city's citizens, ensuring a strong democracy. Unfortunately, as the city shrank over the decades, the focus of the paper turned more toward the suburbs. 'Going Home' brought people

from both sides of Eight Mile Road back together for a common good. That's how it should be," Happy said. But for Morgan, the success of the project led to more questions than answers - questions about how to hold onto the gains of a shortterm success.

Enter Dr. Jane Briggs-Bunting, MSU professor of journalism, and the Tandem Project. "The idea was developed from a Knight Challenge grant," said Briggs- Bunting. "We partnered with the Detroit News neighborhood blog to train citizen journalists to cover their community in an impoverished Detroit neighborhood. Software was created to assist in posting and collecting information. The hope was to replicate this in other areas," Briggs- Bunting added.

The software developer for the project was Morgan, who holds a bachelor's degree in computer science as well as a master's in journalism. "Jane had the Tandem Project and we had the blog," he said. "At first we just wanted to make it easier for people to participate. Then we hatched a plan to use this way of doing journalism to teach students. We combined efforts and started looking for money," Morgan concluded.

The two developed a community journalism class and in 2008 they started teaching it at Wayne State University and University of Detroit Mercy. "We had kids out in the neighborhoods, trying to figure out what it took to get a blog started," said Morgan. "At the same time, Michigan State University was adding 300-level community news classes and a capstone 400-level 'virtual newsroom' class to its journalism curriculum. We're still trying to figure out what the learning objectives are. For example, is it better to follow the same neighborhood or switch around? The 400-class students step back and help the 300-level ones. They're starting to build resources for new kids from those who have done it before," said Morgan.

In the fall of 2008, Morgan enrolled as a Ph.D. student at MSU. His long-term goals include "rebuilding the social networks that used to support local papers, which made for better journalism at the bigger papers also. Jane and I are trying to figure out how to template this and scale it up using students as reporters. The challenge is how to get kids out to work there without doing any damage. They learn accountability - it's live news! Their reports go directly online," said Morgan. The Tandem Project has been a good start. "We're learning to be smarter about citizen contribution," he mused. "They're not expected to do it all. They gather the information and the students synthesize it. We create the continuity and get people excited about helping. We've become a source for people looking to invest in Detroit," Morgan added.

Szymanski '72 Plays Detroit Jazz Fest Trumpeter Plays Tribute at Annual Labor Day Festival

On Sunday, Sept. 4, **Walt Szymanski '72**, trumpeter and band leader directed the J.C. Heard Orchestra in a rousing tribute to the late drummer at the 2011 Detroit Jazz Festival. Szymanski has traveled the globe playing with such jazz luminaries and bands as Clark Terry, Thad Jones, Dizzy Gillespie and the Duke Ellington Orchestra.

Szymanski started performing with legendary jazz musician J.C. Heard during the late 70's and early 80's as his music director and arranger. Heard attended a gig by the trumpeter at the Grand Hotel on Mackinac Island. Szymanski went on to tour extensively around the world with Heard and his band until the drummer's death in 1988. Since then, Szymanski, has been extremely busy with projects ranging from the Mingus Big Band and the Jazz Composers Orchestra, to serving as official Jazz Ambassador for the U.S. State Department and the Kennedy Center. He also served as principal music arranger at President Barack Obama's 2009 Inaugural Event. He soon will be heading to South America for a teaching stint at a prestigious university in Ecuador. He currently resides in New York City.

Szymanski began his musical career at St. Raymond's parish at the age of seven when he was a soprano soloist in their choir. As a high school student at Notre Dame, Szymanski quickly changed from vocalizing to playing the trumpet. He soon captured first chair in wind ensemble and orchestra. He also played lead trumpet in the jazz big band and school pit orchestra. In his senior year at ND, Szymanski was presented the Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia award for the "Best Jazz Trumpet" in the state of Michigan. After graduating from Notre Dame High School, he went on to study jazz at the University of Michigan and Oakland University. 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Possible Botalism Oatbreak Claims Life of Pertile's '90 Dog

When dozens of ducks in the ditch behind *Jack Pertile's '90* Koss Farms home began to act strangely and then die, he took notice. When a number of neighborhood dogs began to act the same way, including his 13-year-old Lhasa Apso mix, Macy, Pertile knew there was a problem.

"Macy suddenly didn't have a clue where she was. She had never run away from home before, but she started running away. I thought it was because she was getting old," he said. "Then, we started seeing other symptoms. She couldn't hear me, and she became very unresponsive. That led to her not being able to walk, swallow or eat," Pertile added.

As the number of dead ducks increased, Pertile said he started to talk to his neighbors. He was shocked at what he


discovered. "Three other older dogs on our street had died, and another four were very sick," he said. "They all had the same symptoms Macy had - pumping their hind legs, difficulty eating and then paralysis," he said.

On July 28, neighbors contacted the Department of Natural Resources. The following day, the Macomb County Animal Control came out to collect some of the dead ducks for further testing by the state.

In a subdivision letter, neighbor Valerie Buckley said Animal Control officials, as well as those from the Macomb County Health Department, told her that the culprit was most likely botulism C. "This particular toxin is very common," Buckley wrote. "It occurs naturally in the environment, it is not harmful to humans or pets unless they were to ingest the contaminated animal remains," she added.

"This does happen periodically, and it will clear up on its own, and there is no treatment. It is not airborne. It only occurs when the ducks feed on the organisms in the mucky bottoms," said Cole Shumaker of the Health Department.

According to the Michigan DNR, botulism C bacteria is widespread in soils in North America, and the toxin produced during the growth of the bacterium is one




Jack Pertile '90 and Family.

of the most poisonous substances known. The only meaningful sign of botulism poisoning is the loss of strength due to muscular paralysis. Seagulls show wing droop and difficulty getting airborne before succumbing to complete paralysis, and ducks are unable to hold up their heads.

Pertile, who sits on the board of directors for Koss Farms, said he believes his dog contracted the same disease from coming into contact with contaminated duck feces, and then licking her paws. "There's always water in the drain, but when we get heavy rains, it floods to about 3 feet high, and looks more like a lake," he said. "You'll see ducks, cranes and all types of waterfowl and even muskrats. But now we're seeing the muskrats die, too. I've lived here for seven years and have never seen anything like this," Pertile said.

Although the residents have yet to hear back on the test results, the ducks are still dying. Pertile said there have been at least 10 more, and his neighbors are taking no chances. "You won't see anyone who lives on the drain letting their dog in the backyard, and if they do, it's on a short leash," he said. "I'm a science teacher, and I understand this is all part of nature, but we all have kids and dogs. We have a play set in our backyard, and I'm not even letting my kids out in the backyard until we've had some really cold weather to neutralize the bacteria," Pertile concluded.

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Marist Mouse Closes

After 72 years of educating scores of Catholic priests, raising sheep and hosting religious retreats, the Marist House on Pleasant Street in Framingham, Massachusetts has closed doors. A budget deficit and more than \$1 million in deferred maintenance forced the closure. "It was a very painful decision," the Rev. Ted Keating, U.S. provincial for the Marists, said.

He and house director, the Rev. Paul Freschette, said the closing was forced by the amount of maintenance that needed to be done and years of budget deficits. "The more we looked at it, the more impossible it became with our limited resources," Keating said. "The Marists plan is to move to Waltham, where they will rent a floor in a more modest house from the Stigmatine congregation," Freschette said. "I think it's going to be hard for us to not be in Framingham," Keating said.

He said he expects the Marists will put the 35-acre parcel up for sale. The property, located at the corner of Temple Street along the Massachusetts Turnpike is assessed by the town at \$4.5 million. The Roman Catholic order, also known as The Society of Mary, opened the Marist House as a seminary in 1939 on a plot then known as Cherry Meadow Gardens. By 1980 the seminary had become a religious retreat and conference center, which the Marists operated until the closure. "It's also home to a family of elderly priests who have retired to the stately brick house. Two years ago there were nearly 20," Freschette said. Now there are five who eat, live and pray together every day. "Now our brothers are pretty much all in retirement homes," said Freschette, who, at 64, considers himself "the kid" in the house.

For years, young priests kept up the property and worked on carpentry and machinery in a workshop. They tended flocks of sheep in the field, grew herbs in a hothouse and harvested corn and carrots from a garden across the street. Nuns living at the adjacent Bishops' Hall would cook for the seminarians. "There's a lot of history for sure," said 89-year-old Rev. Raymond Fournier. "I myself started over here in '39 to '49, on and off," he said. "I used to mow the whole lawn," he recalled. "It used to take us two days," he concluded.

Following his seminary training at the Marist House, Fournier returned to teach in the '60s. After ending his career ministering over two parishes in Vermont, he came back to retire about five years ago. "Living here is a wonderful experience for anyone," he said.

The retired priests and leadership team at the Marist House have grudgingly accepted the closing. "It's not been easy," Freschette said. "Especially for the older priests who don't want to leave a property that's so rooted in history," he said. "They planted the trees out front and have lived to see them mature," he added.

"Naturally it's difficult to let go of all of that," said Rev. Walter Gaudreau, one of the three house leaders. "However, life goes on. It's like a new beginning for us," he concluded.

St. Bridget's Parish on Wheeler Avenue honored the Marists May 22nd with a Mass and reception. "It's a beautiful gesture," Freschette said. "We had a chance to say goodbye," he added.

Selectmen Chairman Dennis Giombetti said the Marists have been a good neighbor. "Very quiet neighbor actually," he said. The sprawling house features 31 bedrooms, conference rooms, an auditorium, two chapels, a large kitchen, dining hall and gift shop. Outside, seminarians built a religious stone shrine to Mary. There's also a pond, crab apple trees from the early orchard, and a football field that Marian High School uses. "Decades ago the seminarians used it to host opposing teams," Freschette said.

Framingham Planning Board director Jay Grande said planners are interested in the future use of the land, which is zoned residential. "It's a very key parcel," Grande said, envisioning it could be turned into a housing development, ideally with open space. Keating, who is based in Washington, D.C., said the Marists are mindful of the impact a sale and property changes could have on neighbors. "We would want to be concerned about them," Keating said.


